

#### LOOK!!!!!! NUCKOLLS REUNION **PLANNED!!!**

Each year those Nuckoll descendants who still live near Galax and Oldtown in Virginia, gather the Sunday before Father's Day to decorate the Nuckoll's Community Cemetery. Mary Lily Nuckolls of Galax, stated, "This is one way we teach our children about their ancestors. Robert, Benjamin Floyd, and Bertha Nuckolls are buried here." Dr. Jim Nuckolls of Galax wrote, "The Nuckolls Cemetery is located in Grayson Co., Virginia just a couple of miles from the city limits of Galax on Highway 58, just west of town. Located on a hilltop on the original Nuckolls farm settled just after the Revolutionary War by Robert Nuckolls. Robert had moved from Louisa to Grayson County, which at that time, was part of the western frontier. The 600-acre farm is still intact along with some of the original house built in 1805 and is now owned by a former Superior Court Judge, Jack Matthew's, who purchased the estate in 1947. The oldest stone in the Cemetery is 1804. A large portion of the Cemetery was dedicated to slave burials and has no stones. The road off Highway 58 leading to the farmhouse and over a winding pasture road to the Cemetery is called Wild Turkey Road."

#### NUCKOLLS SPOT-LIGHT!!!

Kentucky Courier Journal, March 29, 1942 (Article donated by Judy Powell)

"In Shelby County, the antics of a horse named Caesar used to delight tiny Jane Nuckolls".

A keen value of the fitness of things as they are encountered, a supreme sense of humor, intense loyalty to her friends - these are only a few of the possessions of Mrs. Walter Magee Annette, President of the New York Society of Kentucky Women.

Mrs. Annette is a modern, dignified, cultured New York in her numerous activities; her gowns are reminiscent of the Rue De la Paix in its best days. But, she retains her love for the home state, particularly for Clifton Farms on Mulberry Creek in Shelby County, where she was born Jane Nuckolls.

Her father, the gifted Samuel Vance Nuckolls, deeply grounded in the classics, named every animal and fowl on the place for some hero of ancient Greece or Rome. For instance, there was a chestnut horse, crusted by years, but still capable to help children enjoy his antics. His name was Caesar. He carried the Nuckolls and their neighbor children until he could find trees with low-hanging branches, whereupon he promptly passed under them and swept off the laughing voungsters.

A pointer rejoiced under the appellation of Queen Dido. There was Delcinea del Toboso, a duck, and of course, the drake was Don Quixote. Brutus was the bulldog.

Mrs. Annette's mother was Martha Rebecca Thomas,

famed beauty of "Maplehurst," near Eminence.

A true humanitarian, Mrs. Annette helped unfortunate people even as a girl. Her first real work came, however, at Nitro, W., VA., during the first World War, where she served as a graduate Red Cross Nurse. When she and Mr. Annette went to New York, her deep interest in poor and needy persons continued.

For sometime, Mrs. Annette was the treasurer of the New York City Chapter, D.A.R., the largest there, relinquishing that office to become President of the New York Society of Kentucky Women. She is now in her second term and has tripled the membership, as well as expanded the organization's work for several schools in the Kentucky mountains. She is a director of the Outdoor Cleanliness Association of New York and a leading member of the Little Garden Club of New York, of which Mrs. August Zinsser and other Kentucky women are supporters.

Mrs. Annette will not admit she has ever been bored in all her life: "If I feel a bit of fatigue coming on at some long speech or other time-taking happenings, I just close my mind to it and think of pleasant things. I'm interested in everything, however, and not easily tired."

One of little Jane
Nuckolls' earliest pleasures and
a sweet remembrance of Mrs.
Annette, "was the soft loveliness
of a white rose bush on our
terrace in Shelby County. It was
grown from a slip of the original
rose bush brought by the first
Nuckolls settler from England,
where the Nuckolls family
followers of the House of York
during the War of the Roses.
Always a loyal descendant kept a
white rose bush growing in his
garden."

The Nuckolls and Thomas Families came to

Kentucky from Virginia. Mrs. Annette's D.A.R. lines are through the Claiborne, Lindsay, Poague, Montgomery and Thomas families.

Mrs. Annette's powers of description give her a facility of expressions which is delightful. Asked about her special gifts, she replied: "A fairy godmother touched me with her silver wand, saying: 'This child shall have a bubbling sense of humor'."

Mrs. Annete declares she never has made a cut-and-dried speech. She conducts a running fire of chat and comment through a room when it is necessary that she talk, and there is a give-and-take spirit that is impromptu, informal and most refreshing in a town of long-winded "addresses" by many persons whenever they are permitted to face a helpless audience.

Jane Nuckols Annette's presence is eagerly sought by many organizations that have jobs to do and want people who will strip the subject of verbiage and get at the task in the way that will get results. Jane Nuckols Annette does that!

She has held a membership in the Metropolitan Museum of Art for two years, and from her studies there, has a deep appreciation of art. Howard Chandler Christy, James Montgomery Flagg, Russell Patterson and other notables have transplanted some of her warm beauty to canvas.

#### Will of Josiah Nuckols



June 2, 1819 Recorded Oct. 20, 1819

In the name of God Amen, I, Josiah Nuckols of Pittsylvania County, Virginia being sick and weak of body, but of perfect mind and memory thanks be unto God, Calling to mind the mortality of my sistem knowing that it is appointed of all men Once die, do make Constitute and ordain this to be my Last Will and Testament. That is to say principally and first of all I give and recommend my Soul unto the hands of Almighty God and my body to the dust not doubting but at the resurrection I shall receive this Clay Clod body and privily rejoice in the arms of Jesus. And our Touching my earthly Estate wherewith it has pleased God to bestow to me. I dispose of, give and bequeath in the following manner, Vitz:

To my beloved wife, Milley Nuckols, I give and bequeath my whole Estate real and personal (that is) Lands and everything I possess during her natural lifetime, and at the death of my beloved wife, I give and bequeath all my lands to my two Sons, Levi Nuckols and John Nuckols to be equally divided among them both in quantity and quality.


Also at the death of my beloved widow Milley Nuckols, I give and bequeath a equal share (Land excepted) of all my property on each of my children, Namely; Levi Nuckols, Catherine Nuckols, Elizabeth Nuckols, John Nuckols, Martha

Nuckols and Morning Nuckols. I also do appoint my beloved wife Executrix and my son Levi Executor of this my Last Will and Testament.

I also give and bequeath to my son John Nuckols a Horse bridle and saddle. I do hereby utterly disallow and disannul all other wills gifts or Legacies made by me declaring ratifying and confirming this to be my only Will first and last made by me and no other in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and fist my seal this the 2nd day of June in the Year of our Lord Eighteen Hundred and Nineteen.

#### My Dearest Wife

Letter written from Jesse Nuckolls to his wife, Sarah, from Mt. Carmel on May 15, 1862. Copy of letter in possession of Dennis Nuckols, Chatham, Va.

My Dearest Wife

I received your letters on the 12th and 13th and was glad to hear that you were all well. I am enjoying as good as ever. I am at this time on Pickett with eight others. We are having a good time, we board with Mrs. Thomas. Our fare is extra our horses fare finely, it is raining at this time.

It rained all day yesterday. People are mighty behind here with their work. They are not done planting corn, I am sorry to tell you that the health of the Company is not good. There are a great many sick, some have died. Stephen Price is sick, he is at the same place we board at and well treated. John is with me on Pickett he is well. Josiah is at Camp near Madison Court House he is well I am six miles North of the Court House. There was preaching here at this church on Saturday and Sunday and tomorrow is fast day prayer will be held here tomorrow. The people are very good southerns about here and are always glad to see us. I wish to know if you got your vegetables patches planted. I would like to know who has got you any wood since I left and how you are treated generally. And write me word if you have drawed provisions and how many times and how much you got at a time. Write how many chickens you have got I want you to save me some chickens until I get home which won't be long but I cannot tell, that good milk and butter you said you wished I was there to eat. I hope the time won't be long before I shall be with you to help you to eat it, you write me word if Father has got that money from Captain Herndon and Abner Holland if he has not got it you write me word if you need any I will send you some as soon as a good chance offers itself. I would be more than proud to see you and the little ones if was so I could, George, Calvin and Singleton tell George to take care of my dog for I want him to go possum hunting this fall, and how Singleton toe has got and how long it has been sore and if he can talk any I want to know if Monroe has gone back to the Army lately and if Oslome has got home. Remember me through many miles apart. Be you in my daily

Study and Nightly dreams if this war was to end it would not take me long to get home I would like to know if any body is staying with you and whom it is you said that you wished I would hire a Negro if you can hire one do it or get some body to hire one for you for balance of the year. You must send me all the news and anything that will interest me I cannot hear no news here. Give my love to all inquiring friends and tell them to let me hear from them. I would be glad to see all of my old friends once more if it was possible. Tell George Giles that he must write to me and write all the news. You must not grieve yourself so much as you are doing. I hope I shall be at home in some 3 or 4 months. You take more to heart than you ought to do for it will all do no good will only make you miserable. May God be with us and bless and bring me safe to you all once more. May he bless you and all your little ones and if he has so willed it that I should not get back it will only be just in his sight for he rules the whole world and we should not murmur at his own good will but submissively bow to him that will protect you from all harm if you will trust him. Write soon to your affectionate husband until death. Jesse B. Nuckols to his wife Sarah M. Nuckols.

M.B., Josiah and John sends their love and respects to you and to Father, Mother and sisters and mine the same and More.

#### "REMINISCING"

Mrs. Temperance Stanfield Instructs Bexar County Rural Girls in Housekeeping

"A comfortable home is the first step in the pursuit of happiness," Mrs. Temperance Stanfield, 91, for 66 years a housekeeper in a Bexar County rural home told the Oak Island girls home demonstration class in regular monthly meetings, which she conducted in giving the children the benefit of her long experience in home management.

Mrs. Stanfield instructs the girls in the art of housekeeping as she has learned it since coming to Oak Island community in 1858. "Time has wrought great changes in home life since I came here in an ox drawn wagon from Tennessee in '58," she said. "We lived in a hut and didn't even have a sewing machine. We made all our clothes and I remember the first suit my youngest son ever had I made from my husband's breadcloth wedding suit," she

"Reminiscing" continued - smiled.

"You girls who have sewing machines and improved methods of housekeeping and cooking are also fortunate in having home demonstration instruction. In my time we were taught nothing but learned all by hard work.

Mrs. Stanfield now knits incessantly and even patches clothes and darns socks. Reminiscing a little, Mrs. Stanfield told how it took her father, Lewis Nuckolls, her brother, Lewis Nuckolls Jr., her husband and herself nine weeks to reach here from Tennessee. "The wagon broke down several times and we were delayed both by that and high water which had to be forded or ferried across. One time we got lost and a deaf and dumb man showed us the road to take. How he ever did it I don't know, but the road was the right one."

Mrs. Stanfield said she and her husband and brother all came here for their health after they were told by a doctor in Tennessee that they were afflicted with Tuberculosis. One of her sisters, Amelia Stanfield, preceded them to Texas and lived at Oak Island until she was 92 years old, having died last summer. The sisters married Stanfield brothers.

Mrs. Stanfield will be 92 years old September 21. She thinks clearly, her eyes are good and she is in excellent health. "Mother is feeling fine and good for her age," Hugh Stanfield, her son, declared. "She has a little trouble getting around as she fell and broke her hip five years ago, but otherwise she is fit as a fiddle."
