

George L Nuckolls Who Am I?

George L Nuckolls and Fernando A Evans purchased many acres of property together in Franklin County Missouri.

According to all of the records I located, they bought over 600 acres of land for the purposes of mining.

This taken from the Goodspeed History of Franklin Co, MO, 1999 . Under physical description and Mineral Wealth was found this statement::

The Moselle Iron Furnace is located on Section 14, Township 42, Range 1 east, within three-fourths of a mile of Moselle Station. It was built in 1849, by F. A. Evans and George L. Nuckles, in the interest of parties residing in Kentucky. The ore used was in part from the Benton Creek bank, in Crawford County, but a brown hematite was also used, found in the vicinity of the furnace. In 1850 the furnace was started on the cold-blast process of making iron. The output was small, about five or six tons per day, which was hauled to the Missouri River and shipped to markets along the rivers below the mouth of the Missouri. Knuckles mine is in Section 28, Township 41, Range 1 east and has been mined to the depth of about twenty-five feet, (The web page originally had George L Huckles transcribed and I sent a correction)

Each and every one of the 14 deeds clearly spell his name as George L Nuckolls.

My ONLY candidate for this is George Nuckols from Woodford County KY the son of Samuel Nuck-


ols and Mary Carlisle. My reasons are the following:

Watch Made in Bits Keeps Time

 Eldora IA- An Eldora jeweler, Edward W Nuckolls, has in his possession one of the six hand made silver Swiss watches which were made nu John Samps on in London England in 1778. The timepiece has been pronounced by New York expert watchmakers to be a very valuable specimen, and is worth several hundred dollars to a collector. There are three cases, the first outer case, bing made of black tortoise shell, richly embossed and beaded. The watch proper has a silver hunting case which is chased by hand on the outside and silver figures in relief make the case a very handsome one and show that a great deal of work and skill have been displayed to make the rich embossing. The third case is of ordinary silver, the wroks are of the finest watch metal, richly chased and engraved, and the specimen is indeed beautiful as well as unique. The watch keeps spendid time, and even if it is of such great age is more accurate than some of the mode rn watches as a time-keeper. Over twenty-five years ago a stranger who said that he was a farm hand brought the watch into Mr Ezra Nuckolls for repairs and since that time he has never been heard from and the jeweler fee ls that by failure of his many years to reclaim the watch the man has disappeared and the timepiece will rightfully belong to the jeweler

Shooting Affair at Eldora

Dr H W Emery Suffering From Wound in Breast at Hospital

Eldora, April 10- Dr Harry W Emery, a prominent osteopath of this city, is lying at Emergency hospital, suffering from a bullet wound in the left breast, inflicted by Edward Nuckolls, a well-known young man here, and associated with his father

Ezra Nuckolls in the jewelry business. Dr N C Morse, who is caring for the patient, does not as yet venture a prediction as to Emery's chances for living. At about 2 oclock yesterday morning residents in the east part of town heard several shots but knew not where they were fired or what the occasion might be. Some time after daylight it was learned that someone had been shot, and still later the information became circulated about town that Dr Emery was the victim, and that Ed Nuckolls did the shooting. Considerable mystery surrounds the shooting even yet, and different stories can be heard. It is stated that Nuckolls found Emery trying to enter his house at about 2 oclock yesterday morning and emptied his revolver into the flying form in the darkness. Nuckolls did not know until morning however, that he had wounded the doctor. The Nuckolls home has been under quarantine because the Nuckolls children were supposed to have scarlet fever. Mr Nuckolls has not been staying at home, but, hearing the other evening that the children had whooping cough, went home o see just what the situation was. About midnight, it is claimed, he was awakened by a rap at the door. He answered the call and found Dr Emery, who informed Nuckolls that he was looking for him and wanted him to go down to his office and sample some fine wine that he had purchased. Nuckolls complied, but after a short time excused himself, and said he would go to his room at the store and go to bed. Nuckolls was apparently suspicious and instead of going to the store and remaining, went for his revolver and returned home. An hour and a half later Emery is said to have again appeared at the Nuckolls home. Nuckolls followed him long enough to empty his revolver at him. Public sympathy is with Nuckolls, and as yet no arrests have ben made. Emery is a handsome and sashing young man and, it is generally admitted, is responsible for the estrangement in the family of Frank W Crockett, the Des Moines lawyer and brother of former Clerk of the Supreme Court John C Crockett, now reading clerk of the United States Senate. Mrs Crockett was the widow of George Wisner, at one time the wealthiest young man in Hardin County.

Mrs Nuckolls Resigns After 18 Years Service.**

Things are not going to be the same at the Howard-Mitchell-Martin County Selective Service Board offices. The difference is not simply because the board will soon be housed in new offices at the Big Spring Federal Building. The big change will be in the absence from her desk of Mrs Louise Nuckolls who has been the board's executive secretary for over 18 years. Effective Nov 29, Mrs Nuckolls terminated her connection with the Selective Service board. Taking her place will be Mrs James (Roselle) Coates. Mrs Coates has been helping Mrs Nuckolls for the past two and a half years. "I felt if I ever planned to do anything else," explained Mrs Nuckolls, "I had better start pretty soon. I want to try my hand at operating a store and I couldn't do that and hold down my old job at the same time."

The high officials of the Selective Service did not applaud Mrs Nuckolls' plans to retire. They even put quite a lot of pressure on her to stay on the job and there were a lot of letters swapped. Finally Col. Morris Schwartz, state director, realized she was determined to leave and reluctantly approved her resignation. "The contribution Mrs Nuckolls made to this office is amazing", commented John W Hughes, chairman of the board. "She has worked hard and has been largely responsible for a

smooth operation of the office. Her dedication and patient endeavor has made the job of the board members much lighter. We are going to miss her very much, and while we are sure Mrs Coates will do a fine job, we will still feel like something is missing for a long time. Louise has been the "front man" for the Selective Service office so long it is difficult to imagine the office without her."

....meanwhile, Mrs Nuckolls is getting all set to try something new. "After all," she said, "I've never had a chance to see what else I can do. My first job was with the OPA during World War II. I came to this office in May 1950 -the Korean War was just getting going - and it's now been nearly 19 years since I began work here."

She plans to join her daughter Mrs Kenneth (Sharon) Dees who is now operating Dee's Fashion Center, 3714 Gregg. Mrs Nuckolls has been a partner in this enterprise ever since it began and now will take an active part in its operation. Expansion of stock and other improvements are in her plan for the store. Her husband is with Standard Oil and they live at 644 Manor Lane. Mrs Nuckolls is a native of Howard County. Her parents are Mr and Mrs John K Whitaker, 1105 Runnels. Mrs Nuckolls attended Cahoma schools and later after she had graduated, enrolled in a business college. With the beginning of World War II, she took a job with the Office of Price Administration.


