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The Nuckolls News is published quarterly by the Nuckolls Worldwide Kindred Society for the benefit of our members, and for all who have an interest in the surnames NUCKOLLS/NUCKOLS/NUCHOLS/NUCKLES/KNUCKLES/NUCKOLES/, etc. The Society was formed in 1995 by Sandi Koscak, Adrian Hopkins and Edward Reynolds in an effort to reprint the book "First Virginia Nuckolls and Kindred" by Bertha Nuckolls including an index which was not in the publication. When the cost of reprinting was beyond a budget on a personal level, they decided to form a Society to raise the funds for reprinting the book. We wanted to also include our direct lines to include in the new publication, and the project soon became so popular, that many people contacted me with their lines to also be included. The book which was originally 175 pages then became a major publication with over 1200 pages. We have published the newsletter 4 times yearly since the Society was founded.

Most of the NUCKOLLS families in North America come from either of two origins. One comes from a story from the granddaughter of Nathaniel Nuckolls. "For over three hundred years, there have been Nuckols families in Scotland, so James could have very well been from there. Whatever his roots, James was a yeoman, a man who worked for years to earn the right to a piece of land. A small piece, by the standards of the James River planters, but land of his own, that may still be in the possession of his descendants, some three hundred years later. A letter copied Aug 31, 1957 by Bertha Nuckolls, written by Ann Elizabeth Nuckolls, daughter of Nathaniel Nuckolls, granddaughter of Thomas Nuckolls "his ancestors came from Dunfermline, Scotland, and settled in Virginia.""



Another source appears here: History of Ohio, American Historical Society, Chicago, 1925. Section V pg 302 "While analysis of the surname Nuckols seems to indicate a remote German origin, the American branch of the family traces its lineage to a sturdy Scotchman, who was a substantial shipbuilder in Scotland, where he maintained his home in the City of Glasgow. According to well established family tradition there were nine Nuckols brothers who came from Scotland to America, and their posterity is now scattered about in different states of the union. Investigation made by representatives of later generations of the family all seem to indicate a common ancestor, the Glasgow shipbuilder. " The Ross Co, Ohio biography of James Austin Nuckols proudly attests to the Scottish shipbuilder from Glasgow.

From the chronological history of Scotland we find that 1684 The first trans-Atlantic voyage made by a Clyde ship (The "George") when a vessel sailed from Greenock employed on a special mission to America with 22 persons transported to Carolina for attending conventiclers and 'being disaffected to Government'. In 1719 First Greenock based vessel (built at Crawforddyke in 1719) crosses Atlantic. It was part of the Darien expedition, having been fitted out at Cartsydyke in 1697. (This expedition was to Panama)

Because our first records of Nuckolls are 1657 York County, 1689 in New Kent Co and 1702 in Hanover, the "Scottish Shipbuilder" would have had to come to America prior to 1657, prior to the time Scotland was able to produce sea-going vessels. NUCKOLLS Of England

Legend of the Nuckols Rose

From a self- published book by Frances C Griffin, 1313 Butts Station Road, Chesapeake, VA 23320 entitled "Nuckles of Virginia" "It says by tradition in the Nuckles family that three brothers came from York England. They were merchants. Their names were John, James and William. They came to Jamestown Virginia. They, with the colonists came over and established the first permanent English colony in America....." Further support of this story is found in **THE NEW RIVER FRONTIER SETTLEMENT ON THE VIRGINIA-NORTH CAROLINA BORDER 1760-1820** by Paula Hathaway Anderson-Green* Published in the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, V86: pgs. 413-431 ,1978.

In Pioneer Settlers, (by Benjamin Floyd Nuckolls), Nuckolls states that according to family tradition three Nuckolls brothers from York, England, came to Jamestown, VA; their descendants spread out in Virginia. From the brother John came a line into Louisa Co., with a John who m. Mary Garland circa 1776. Then circa 1790 John and Mary's family moved from Louisa to New River on Meadow Creek, following a cousin Charles Nuckolls, who came in 1780. Eventually John and Mary returned to Louisa, but several sons remained in the Grayson area, as did descendants (some moved on to TN and KY)

Perhaps there is more romance than truth.


"John Nuckolls married Agatha Bullock in Virginia, perhaps in Dinwiddie County. The Nuckolls family came over from England and settled in Virginia. Their history runs back to 1452, when the "War of the Roses" began. The house of York led one faction and the house of Lancaster the other. They were adherents to the house of York, the emblem of which was the white rose. One family that sided with York in that struggle was named Nuckolls. When the original Nuckolls emigrated to America he brought a bush of that rose with him. Each member of the family kept a bush of this famous rose. When John Nuckolls and his wife Agatha, came to South Carolina, they brought the rose with them and planted it at Whig Hill, near Grindall Shoals. From that plant, their descendants got cuttings or roots, and several members of the family had the white rose until 1860, when sentiment was knocked out of the hearts of many of our people. If the Rose of York is now living, it is at the residence of John D Jeffries, who owns the W T Nuckolls homestead. "Aunt Nancy " Dawkins had the rose until the time of her death, about 1861 or 1862, and T D Littlejohn now owns the famous homestead."

NUCKOLLS COAT OF ARMS

The arms has very interesting meaning. The colors denote truth, justice, peace and virtuous qualities, wisdom and steadfastness. The gold chief of the shield denotes illustrious deeds, elevation of mind, domination, and authority. The three Cornish choughs* are the emblem of long life. It is the king of crows, a carnivorous bird. The silver pales symbolize military strength and fortitude given to those who defend cities, or who had supported his government of their sovereigns by standing up rightly for prince or country. Engrailed signifies on land or earth. In crest, the ear of golden wheat, we find symbolized that the bearer deserves well for his hospitality and it is also an allusion to plenty. *Cornish Chough: is called "the king of crows." "...may betoken the bearer thereof to be a man of stratagems to the disadvantage of his enemies." Might (also) betoken "watchful activity for friends."




DNA NEWS

The Nuckolls Worldwide Kindred Society began a DNA project 3 years ago in order to try and connect some families who were not documented to be descended from the immigrant ancestor, James Nuckolls who signed the Blissland Complaint in April 1677.

The DNA project began with descendants from the lines of Silvester Nuchols (VA-NC-TN) and John Nuckles of North Carolina. DNA results confirmed they had the same ancestor as recent as 6-8 generations, which made these two most likely brothers having the same father. As of this date, we have not proven their connection, but have a likely candidate in Charles Nuckolls who lives in same county of Warren NC on the tax list from 1771—1786. The William Nuckolls in Warren Co, NC in 1715 is the possible father of Charles. William's date of birth would match with the son William of the immigrant who was born c1768. Although no confirmed documentation, all of these dates and locations seem to have a nice fit.

With other test results, we were able to determine what seems to be a merging line of African American descent. DNA results with Haplogroups of **E1b1a** are of African descent.



We would also like to obtain DNA from a male descendant of William and his first unknown wife through their son Thomas who would be the Josiah Nuckolls family who settled in Pittsylvania Co, Callands, VA. The more pieces we can add to this puzzle the more likely we will be able to find how the DNA merged into our Nuckolls line..

JAMES WILLIAM NUCKOLLS Of Independence Co, Arkansas

I received a copy of Family History of James L. Brown in 2004 at a Nuckolls family reunion in Cord, Arkansas. James Lafayette Brown was married to Mary Elizabeth Nuckolls. From reviewing this last night after reading your email, I find the information was compiled on January 1 1931 by J. L. Brown and added to in 1972 by the J. L. Brown descendants. I feel pretty good about the veracity of the information since the compilation was done less than a year after Martha Crigler Nuckolls death on June 13 1930. Send me your address and I will mail the data to you. I would like to know more of the Nuckolls lineage. Do you have a tree on Ancestry? I am a descendant of David William Nuckolls daughter Sallie Nuckolls McFadden, my great grandmother

I will search my records for a possible Nuckolls male for DNA testing. All I know on William and Maria are their parents names and that they were born and died in Virginia. The oral history is that William and Maria died while James W. Nuckolls was young and he was raised by his oldest sister. I do not know her name. Young James left Virginia as he felt his brother in law mistreated his sister. James Nickols is in the household 218/218 of William Marewether in the 1850 Census Black River Township, Independence County, Arkansas, Series M432, Roll 26, Page 327. I have not been working on this line lately but notice the reference that he has a brother who followed him to Arkansas and his descendants are still in Arkansas. At this time I do not have a name to give you, but I will work on that. Looking at the Nuckolls in Virginia, I am struck by the fact that Martha Crigler is a descendant of Jacob Crigler/Kreigler of the Germanna Colony in Virginia. He migrated to Virginia about 1718, I would have to look at my files.

He and his brother (?) came to N E Arkansas years before the Civil War. He managed slaves on the Meriweather plantation

The Nuckolls Family

Very little is known of the Nuckolls family. It is believed to have been pure English. A tradition that he was related to the Royal House of England. Mary and Elizabeth were favorite family names.

James W Nuckolls was born in Virginia. His parents died while he was young and he was reared by his oldest sister, whose husband was unkind to her. Young James left Virginia because he feared that otherwise he might someday kill his brother-in-law. He came to Arkansas and was foreman on the Meriweather plantation when he married Martha Crigler in 1852. They met at a quilting party, upon which occasion she refused to quilt with the other girls and he insisted on standing by her side and watching her work with the elderly women. Apparently it was love at first sight with him.-she always afterwards averred that she married him in order to get rid of him. He had to borrow a shirt for his wedding, and they began housekeeping in a plantation cabin furnished with only a bed, table and chairs of their own making. Twenty-five years later he was one of the wealthiest men of his community, possessing the most imposing home, many acres of rich creek bottom land, a cotton gin, and grist, flour and lumber mills. During the Civil War, James was suspected of hiding Confederate soldiers, and a group of Union soldiers were preparing to lynch him when he be-thought himself of and gave the Masonic signal of distress, whereupon one of the soldiers, who was also a mason, intervened and saved his life. They had nine children. James died of a fractured hip at the age of 83.

James had a brother that came with him from Virginia to Arkansas. This brother has descendants now (1972) living in Tulsa, Stillwater, OK and Little Rock, AR.

(Note from Nuckolls Society) His brother David has never been located beyond the 1850 census, and 40 years of research (so far) have never revealed any descendants of David.

About his wife Martha Criger:

Nicholas Crigler was the son of Abraham Crigler and his wife Lydia Carpenter. The family were "Pennsylvania Dutch" and their ancestors moved from Pennsylvania to Kentucky probably at a very early date. About 1850 the family migrated to Independence County Arkansas and settled near the village of Charlotte. Practically all of the children were born in Kentucky.

Martha Crigler married James Williams Nuckolls, an Englishman from Virginia, who was in charge of the Negro slaves on the Meriweather plantation, on Dota Creek, before the Civil War. Martha acted the part of doctor to a large area in Eastern Independence County. She lived to be 97 years old.

Martha loved children and would sit up with them until nearly midnight telling them interesting things in her life. I shall never forget grandmother telling us (her grandchildren) about when they were moving from Kentucky to Arkansas, they camped several nights on the bank of a river. She said each night the big black bears that lived in the woods, would swim the river and catch hogs and that they could hear the hogs "squealing" all night long. (By Wm E Brown, son of J L Brown). Martha was a very energetic person and early became interested in caring for the sick. One of her experiences consisted of being present at a home where a hypnotist (whom she was afraid of, because he had long curly hair growing out of his ears), was called in to prescribe for an ill member of the family; he hypnotized another of the women present, who then laid her hand on the patient, described the condition of the affected organs, and gave direction for treatment. Martha learned many things from and old Indian "medicine man" named Corbett. He taught her how to make ointment from Indian weel and from copper sulphate, then called "Bluestone". During the month of May she would save enough butter to use as ointment throughout the year may butter was thought to contain special medicinal

qualities, which she prepared by heating until the water was evaporated and then stored in sealed containers. She served the community for miles around as a doctor, midwife, and nurse, and continued this activity until she was past the age of seventy. Some of her favorite remedies were whiskey and hot poultices for pneumonia, bluestone grease for croup and sore throat, sheep tea for measles, faz seed poultices for all bruises and sprains, and calomel for everything. She was active all of her life and died at the ripe old age of 97 of pneumonia, a disease that took away most old people, for they had no good cure for it at the time.



Now this brings us to the research efforts on this family. We will present the evidence, then try to fit him into a family line. It would be of a great benefit to have a DNA result from a male donor to see if he is of the Scottish or African line.

James was born in 1823 so should be a male child in 1830 and 1840. Not knowing when his parents died and her moved in with his sister makes it more difficult. Not knowing who his sister married makes it twice the level of difficulty. Does the Mereweather plantation in Arkansas connect with the Merriweather-Nuckolls connection in Virginia? Both the 1830 and 1840 census records have been checked for a William Nuckolls. The following are the candidates:

1830 Virginia Census

NUCKOLS WILLIAM Louisa County VA 025 010001-22001

(Son of Wm Nuckolls and Henrietta Terry died 1830-1840)

He married Mariah Sharp and is was prime candidate. Could Mariah have been married before? A deviation of the name Maria is not common, yet both Mariah Sharp and Mariah Williams have same given name. Neither William nor Mariah appear in the 1840 census. Marriage in 1819 gives room for James to be born 1823 and his brother David was born 1830, probably after the 1830 census was taken in June.

NUCKLES WILLIAM Tazewell County VA 209 3100001-001101

Although this William is not known,

The spelling is not correct and he married a Lucy Shanter in 1821.

So now I return to William Nuckols of Louisa County. Aside from the spelling it fits.

Susan Evilsizer Nuckols, dau of Thomas and Nancy Nuckols married a William Anderson Nuckolls a son of William Nuckolls and Martha S...We show William A and Susan with one L suggesting he conformed to her spelling. The problem lies in his date of birth prior to his parents marriage meaning Mariah Sharp may not be his mother.. Married 1819, Wm Born 1814. Would he name two sons William? One William Anderson and another James William. If by 2 wives, there remains a possibility.

William Nuckols and Henrietta Terry had 3 daughters we have accounted for.

Sarah born 1786 married Samuel Waldrop in 1817 would not appear in 1830 census

Ann born 1792 not in 1830 census, no marriages of Ann Nuckols in Louisa Co, suggest she died before 1830

Keziah born 1802-1810 would be one of the 4 daughters in the 1830 census leaving 3 undocumented. No Louisa marriages are unaccounted for leaving these females possible as a sister of James William. Many Goochland marriages undocumented, like Elizabeth born 1821 md Samuel Atkinson 1845...

Comments, suggestions, ideas???? Do we have a headache yet?

James William Nuckolls named a daughter Rhoda... Can this be a clue?

Who is Rhoda Nuckols in Louisa County 1830?




FOUND CONNECTIONS

Thanks to Fredwyn for identifying the marriage in Knox Co, KY. Robert NUCKLES married Polly Payne 7/16/1891. This was the son of Obediah, Bobby. After his first wife Margaret Henderson died in 1890, he married again. Second marriages are usually confirmed with census records, but because I was never able to locate him in 1900, I was unaware of his new wife. He died in 1905.

Trying to piece together the marriages of the children of Obediah's son John and wife Jennie Bray has been quite a task. The problem arises with children's names and ages differing from one census to another. Two sons named William pose additional problems. We can assume only one was a blood son, but do not know who the elder really belongs to. Because there was a marriage of a Mary Jane to Franklin Young, and we know daughter Mary was married to David Scarborough having lots of kids, I can be sure this is really the Telitha Jane in the census, and that she married her cousin Franklin Young, a son of Benjamin Franklin Young and Nancy Nuckles. The wedding was a the home of her mother Jennie assuring us she was of this family...no further record is located for the newlyweds. Son William HM is the one who most likely married Martha Hill 4/12/1887. He was a witness to his sister Louisa marriage to Josiah Wren 12/9/1878. No further record of this William either.


History of Columbus Motor Speedway

Columbus Motor Speedway (CMS), organized in 1945 by the late John Nuckles and a group of motorcycle enthusiasts, has become one of the top drawing sporting attractions in central Ohio during the past 50 years. After purchasing a 50 acre tract of land on the southeast edge of Columbus in 1945, the group, led by Nuckles carved out a one-third mile "true" oval and held the first motorcycle race in the fall of 1946.

In 1947 there were two motorcycle events and a roadster show held at the speedway. Motorcycles and occasionally roadsters raced at the speedway until 1950 when lights were installed and the first stock car event held. Races were run every Friday night featuring 1937 - 1949 coupes and sedans. The track was paved in 1957 and the program progressed from the stocks to the super modifieds and eventually to the current super Late Models.

In 1953 the track was incorporated with 11 members comprising the board of directors and John Nuckles serving as President. The elder Nuckles continued to run the speedway until his unexpected death in 1965. The highest paying race of the year is now held in his memory, and the 1996 John Nuckles Memorial will be presented July 27th. In the years surrounding Nuckles' death, all of the original members of the corporation left. In 1971 James Nuckles, the only son of John and Esther Nuckles, became the sole owner. The speedway has subsequently become a family operation with Jim's son Jerry acting as Vice President and his wife Barbara serving as concession manager. Jim's youngest son Jeff, is the promotional director while his oldest son John is a consultant. Jim and Barbara's fourth son, Jamie, was also actively involved at the oval until his death in 1974.

FOUND AT ANCESTRY — NUCKOLLS NAME

The surname of NUCKOLLS was a baptismal name 'the son of CLAUSEN' a form of NICHOLAS, which was a name meaning 'people's victory'. The name was popular among Christians throughout Europe in the Middle Ages, largely as a result of the fame of a 4th century Lycian bishop, about whom a large number of legends grew up, and who was venerated in the Orthodox Church as well as the Catholic. East European forms of this name are spelt with the initial M, as Mikulas in Poland. The name was sometimes borne by women in the Middle Ages. After the Crusades in Europe, in the 11th 12th and 13th century people began, perhaps unconsciously, to feel the need of a family name, or at least a name in addition to the simple one that had been possessed from birth. The nobles and upper classes, especially those who went on the Crusades, observed the prestige and practical value of an added name, and were quick to take a surname. The name may also have denoted someone who farmed land belonging to a monastery, and who paid rent in the form of provisions for the monks. The name has numerous variant spellings which include NICOLAS, NICKLESS, NICHOL, NICKOL, NICKEL, NICKLE, NICOLAU, NICCOLAI, NICHOLS and NICOLLIC, to name but a few. Notables of the name include NICHOLAS I (The Great) (circa. 820-867) pope from 858 to 867. He asserted the supremacy of the church against secular rulers such as Lothair, king of Lorraine (whose divorce he forbade) and church leaders like the archbishop of Reims. His feast day is 13th November. NICHOLAS II, originally Gerard of Burgundy (circa. 980-1061), pope from 1058 to 1061. NICHOLAS V, originally Pietro Rainalducci (died. 1033) antipope from 1328 to 1330. Otto NICOLAI (1810-49) the German composer, born in Konigsberg. In 1847 he became kapellmeister at Berlin, where his opera 'The Merry Wives of Windsor' was produced before he died. William NICOL (circa.1744-1797) was the Scottish schoolmaster, a classics master in the High School of Edinburgh. He was a friend of Robert Burns, who immortalized him in the poem 'Willie Brewed a Peck O'Maut'. The lion depicted in the arms is the noblest of all wild beasts which is made to be the emblem of strength and valour, and is on that account the most frequently borne in Coat-Armour.

**(No census records for Martha or Hattie, remains unknown)*

Foiled Despicable Attempt to Jeopardize Morality of a Young Girl Heartless Mother Is Back by Women of the Liberty League Horrible Revelations in Court

The Kentucky Irish American has from its first number in a family newspaper, and its editor has tried all ways to leave out of its columns even a semblance of the filth that is frequently found in the less circumspect daily journals. Occasionally desperate diseases require heroic remedies, and as a case in point attention is called to the attempt of Mrs. Hattie Nuckols, who on last Tuesday attempted through habeas corpus proceedings to secure the release of her 16-year-old daughter, Martha Nuckols, from the Convent Of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd. Over a year ago Martha Nuckols had been placed under the care of these good women, who are doing a noble work. Martha had in sound in a disreputable locality and in company with a man of bad character. She, on account of her apparent tender years, was arrested and brought into court. Judge Ruben Buckley, who is not a Catholic, was at that time Judge of the police court. He assessed a fine and workhouse sentence, in lieu of which the girl was turned over to the Children's Board Of Guardians, who committed her to the care Of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd.

She has been in that institution more than a year, and as she herself testified, has been well cared for and well treated. Her mother, it seems, at the earnest solicitation of others, undertook to secure her release. Every evidence pointed to the fact that the mother only desired her daughters release in order that the girl might enter upon a life of shame and that the mother might live through the profits of her daughters prostitution. . The mother was represented in court by W. T. Burch, the attorney for the Woman's Liberty League, and organization akin to the A. P. A. Mr. Burch recently, it will be remembered, God and bad with the Louisville Bar Association on account of questionable transactions and the practice of his profession. Alderman James J. Fitzgerald represented The Sisters.

The case was up before Judge Asher G. Caruth of the criminal division of the Jefferson Circuit Court. The evidence showed that Mrs. Nuckols was the mother of six children, three boys and three girls; that she had cause the boys to be committed to be Louisville Industrial School of Reform; that she had caused her husband to be sent to the penitentiary, where he now is on the charge of committing and unmentionable offense; and that her two elder girls were now living lives of shame. Mrs. Nuckols attempted to through that her daughter was 19 years of age and introduced in evidence a copy of the Bible, on one leaf of which was written the alleged date of the birth of her daughter Martha. She declined to state why the dates of the births of the other children were not put down. Mr. Fitzgerald took the book and upon opening it discovered that it was printed in 1899. This was a knockout blow. Mrs. Nuckols then stated that the writing had been done on Tuesday morning. She refused to say who's handwriting it was. During the hearing of the case Mrs. Nuckols and her attorney Burch were given the moral support of Dr. DT Smith and several women of the Liberty League. Judge Caruth promptly refused writ and returned the girl to the care of The Sisters. In passing on the case judge Caruth said: "in this case it was shown that the mother of Martha Nuckols had brought into the world six children, three boys and three girls. The boys, on her petition stating that she could not control them, were committed to the School of Reform and are now in that institution. Of the three girls to our office at two and inmates of houses of ill -- fame. The remaining child, Martha Nuckols, when of tender years, was sent by the mother repeatedly to the places where her other daughters were plying their occupation and the most disreputable quarters of the city to get money from her sisters for the support of the family -- the mother dies living on the prostitution of the otters. One midnight this child Martha was arrested in the "red -- light district," in company with a man under such circumstances as warranted her detention up on a charge of disorderly conduct. On the trial in the Police Court the extreme penalty of the law for this offense, viz, \$20 fine and a bond of \$1000 for 12 months, was fixed. But on the intervention of some charitable citizens, in lieu of this judgment the Court committed her to the custody of the Board Of Children's Guardians, as under the statute it had a right to do. The Board of Children's Guardians placed her under the care of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd. She is now at St. Xavier's on Bank Street, and well cared for. It is complained that, the mother being a Baptist and the institution in which her daughter is confined being conducted by a Sisterhood of the Roman Catholic Church, she should the returned to the mother. The mother has shown her self totally incapable of raising her children in moral courses. This is not a question of religion, but of humanity. This is the only institution in the city devoted to the care and reformation of fallen women, and which places around young girls it's protesting walls and prevents them from entering upon lives of shame. I Accurate except the guilty of a crime if I said this young girl away from the control and influence of these good Sisters and gave her to this unworthy mother. I will not do this. The response to this writ is held sufficient and the writ is dismissed." Judge Caruth is to be commended for the stand he took in this case. He is not a Catholic, nor did he act through the influence of any Catholic or set of Catholics. He acted the part of a humane man who desires to save a fellow creature from moral destruction.

Judge Toney denied a writ of habeas corpus this week to the motley crew who are seeking to take from the care of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd the Nuckols girl, who they would save from a life of shame. In delivering his opinion Judge Toney was even more severe than Judge Caruth, who refused the writ applied for about a week before.

INFAMOUS DALE CARNEGIE

Carnegie's Boy Chum Caught by Swindlers

Among the Nebraska victims of Daniels & Co, the New York "bankers" raided a few days ago by the police is Samuel Nuckolls, of Kenesaw Nebraska, who for old friendship's sake, is given a pension of \$500 a year by Andrew Carnegie. Nuckolls' parents brought him from Scotland when he was a little boy. On the same boat was Andrew Carnegie, at that time also a small boy. The two children became greatly attached to each other during the voyage and when the parents of each discovered they were bound for Pittsburgh, they also became friends. The boys kept up their friendship after Pittsburg was reached and during the early years when they both were forced to work hard, frequently divided salaries with each other when necessary. The Nuckolls' decided to come west to seek their fortune, locating in Nebraska. He homesteaded a quarter section and for many years prospered. Carnegie remained in the East and in time reached his present position. But the two men continued their friendship and kept up a correspondence. Ten years ago the drouths came and farmers in Western Nebraska met with such reverses that many lost their all. Among these was Mr Nuckolls, Shortly afterwards, in writing to Carnegie, Nuckolls told of his loss. Immediately the steel king arranged to pay his boyhood friend a pension of \$500 per year during the balance of life. It is supposed that newspaper advertizements induced Mr Nuckolls to invest with Daniels & Co, Denver News.

A Carnegie Pensioner Caught

Andrew Carnegie's sole Nebraska pensioner, Samuel Nuckols of Kenesaw was caught in the collapse of Daniel & Company, the alleged get-rich-quick concern, which was raided by the New York Police some days ago. Nuckols was induced to invest by advertising matter which he received. Carnegie and Nuckols came to America on the same boat when boys, and have continued their friendship ever since. After living near each other in Pittsburgh for a number of years, Nuckols came to Nebraska and took up homestead. When in 1892 the crop failed in Nebraska and there was much suffering, Carnegie remembered his old-time friend and settled a life pension of \$500 a year on him.

-  This Samuel Nuckols has never been located in a census record.
-  The 1885 State Territorial Census for Nebraska (Kenesaw Twp) has no Samuel Nuckols
-  There is not Samuel Nuckols in any census who was born in Scotland
-  The passenger manifest of the ship that Andrew Carnegie came to America on from Scotland shows no person named Samuel or Nuckols.
-  No Nuckols family other than Ezra & Heath Nuckolls family settled in Nebraska.
-  No Nuckols were found in Pittsburgh Pennsylvania while the Carnegies lived there. A house-by-house search was done of the census for several neighborhoods.
