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The Nuckolls News is published quarterly by the Nuckolls Worldwide Kindred Society for the benefit of our members, and for all who have an interest in the surnames NUCKOLLS/NUCKOLS/NUCHOLS/NUCKLES/KNUCKLES/NUCKOLES/, etc. The Society was formed in 1995 by Sandi Koscak, Adrian Hopkins and Edward Reynolds in an effort to reprint the book "First Virginia Nuckolls and Kindred" by Bertha Nuckolls including an index which was not in the publication. When the cost of reprinting was beyond a budget on a personal level, they decided to form a Society to raise the funds for reprinting the book. We wanted to also include our direct lines to include in the new publication, and the project soon became so popular, that many people contacted me with their lines to also be included. The book which was originally 175 pages then became a major publication with over 1200 pages. We have published the newsletter 4 times yearly since the Society was founded.

Most of the NUCKOLLS families in North America come from either of two origins. One comes from a story from the granddaughter of Nathaniel Nuckolls. "For over three hundred years, there have been Nuckols families in Scotland, so James could have very well been from there. Whatever his roots, James was a yeoman, a man who worked for years to earn the right to a piece of land. A small piece, by the standards of the James River planters, but land of his own, that may still be in the possession of his descendants, some three hundred years later. A letter copied Aug 31, 1957 by Bertha Nuckolls, written by Ann Elizabeth Nuckolls, daughter of Nathaniel Nuckolls, granddaughter of Thomas Nuckolls "his ancestors came from Dunfermline, Scotland, and settled in Virginia.""



Another source appears here: History of Ohio, American Historical Society, Chicago, 1925. Section V pg 302 "While analysis of the surname Nuckols seems to indicate a remote German origin, the American branch of the family traces its lineage to a sturdy Scotchman, who was a substantial shipbuilder in Scotland, where he maintained his home in the City of Glasgow. According to well established family tradition there were nine Nuckols brothers who came from Scotland to America, and their posterity is now scattered about in different states of the union. Investigation made by representatives of later generations of the family all seem to indicate a common ancestor, the Glasgow shipbuilder. " The Ross Co, Ohio biography of James Austin Nuckols proudly attests to the Scottish shipbuilder from Glasgow.

From the chronological history of Scotland we find that 1684 The first trans-Atlantic voyage made by a Clyde ship (The "George") when a vessel sailed from Greenock employed on a special mission to America with 22 persons transported to Carolina for attending conventiclers and 'being disaffected to Government'. In 1719 First Greenock based vessel (built at Crawforddyke in 1719) crosses Atlantic. It was part of the Darien expedition, having been fitted out at Cartsdyke in 1697. (This expedition was to Panama)

Because our first records of Nuckolls are 1657 York County, 1689 in New Kent Co and 1702 in Hanover, the "Scottish Shipbuilder" would have had to come to America prior to 1657, prior to the time Scotland was able to produce sea-going vessels. NUCKOLLS Of England

Legend of the Nuckols Rose

From a self- published book by Frances C Griffin, 1313 Butts Station Road, Chesapeake, VA 23320 entitled "Nuckles of Virginia" "It says by tradition in the Nuckles family that three brothers came from York England. They were merchants. Their names were John, James and William. They came to Jamestown Virginia. They, with the colonists came over and established the first permanent English colony in America....." Further support of this story is found in **THE NEW RIVER FRONTIER SETTLEMENT ON THE VIRGINIA-NORTH CAROLINA BORDER 1760-1820** by Paula Hathaway Anderson-Green* Published in the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, V86: pgs. 413-431 ,1978.

In Pioneer Settlers, (by Benjamin Floyd Nuckolls), Nuckolls states that according to family tradition three Nuckolls brothers from York, England, came to Jamestown, VA; their descendants spread out in Virginia. From the brother John came a line into Louisa Co., with a John who m. Mary Garland circa 1776. Then circa 1790 John and Mary's family moved from Louisa to New River on Meadow Creek, following a cousin Charles Nuckolls, who came in 1780. Eventually John and Mary returned to Louisa, but several sons remained in the Grayson area, as did descendants (some moved on to TN and KY)

Perhaps there is more romance than truth.

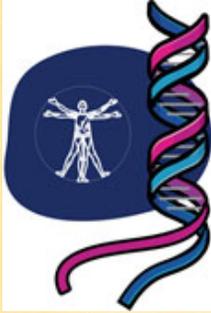
"John Nuckolls married Agatha Bullock in Virginia, perhaps in Dinwiddie County. The Nuckolls family came over from England and settled in Virginia. Their history runs back to 1452, when the "War of the Roses" began. The house of York led one faction and the house of Lancaster the other. They were adherents to the house of York, the emblem of which was the white rose. One family that sided with York in that struggle was named Nuckolls. When the original Nuckolls emigrated to America he brought a bush of that rose with him. Each member of the family kept a bush of this famous rose. When John Nuckolls and his wife Agatha, came to South Carolina, they brought the rose with them and planted it at Whig Hill, near Grindall Shoals. From that plant, their descendants got cuttings or roots, and several members of the family had the white rose until 1860, when sentiment was knocked out of the hearts of many of our people. If the Rose of York is now living, it is at the residence of John D Jeffries, who owns the W T Nuckolls homestead. "Aunt Nancy " Dawkins had the rose until the time of her death, about 1861 or 1862, and T D Littlejohn now owns the famous homestead."

NUCKOLLS COAT OF ARMS

The arms has very interesting meaning. The colors denote truth, justice, peace and virtuous qualities, wisdom and steadfastness. The gold chief of the shield denotes illustrious deeds, elevation of mind, domination, and authority. The three Cornish choughs* are the emblem of long life. It is the king of crows, a carnivorous bird. The silver pales symbolize military strength and fortitude given to those who defend cities, or who had supported his government of their sovereigns by standing up rightly for prince or country. Engrailed signifies on land or earth. In crest, the ear of golden wheat, we find symbolized that the bearer deserves well for his hospitality and it is also an allusion to plenty. *Cornish Chough: is called "the king of crows." "...may betoken the bearer thereof to be a man of stratagems to the disadvantage of his enemies." Might (also) betoken "watchful activity for friends."

DNA NEWS


The Nuckolls Worldwide Kindred Society began a DNA project 3 years ago in order to try and connect some families who were not documented to be descended from the immigrant ancestor, James Nuckolls who signed the Blissland Complaint in April 1677.

The DNA project began with descendants from the lines of Silvester Nuchols (VA-NC-TN) and John Nuckles of North Carolina. DNA results confirmed they had the same ancestor as recent as 6-8 generations, which made these two most likely brothers having the same father. As of this date, we have not proven their connection, but have a likely candidate in Charles Nuckols who lives in same county of Warren NC on the tax list from 1771—1786. The William Nuckols in Warren Co, NC in 1715 is the possible father of Charles. William’s date of birth would match with the son William of the immigrant who was born c1768. Although no confirmed documentation, all of these dates and locations seem to have a nice fit.

With other test results, we were able to determine what seems to be a merging line of African American descent. DNA results with Haplogroups of **E1b1a** are of African descent.

Proven the William the Patriot the son of Susannah Pouncey. Susannah the daughter of James Nuckolls. The father of William a likely BUNCH since 36 markers match for DNA. See [Will of James Nuckolls](#) and read Indenture of [William the Patriot](#). Both published in this current newsletter.

EDWARD WORTHEN NUCKOLLS

The Kansas City Star 4/26/1905 Watch Made in Bits Keeps Time
From the Des Moines Register

Eldora IA- An Eldora jeweler, Edward W Nuckolls, has in his possession one of the six hand made silver Swiss watches which were made nu John Samps on in London England in 1778. The timepiece has been pronounced by New York expert watchmakers to be a very valuable specimen, and is worth several hundred dollars to a collector. There are three cases, the first outer case, being made of black tortoise shell, richly embossed and beaded. The watch proper has a silver hunting case which is chased by hand on the outside and silver figures in relief make the case a very handsome one and show that a great deal of work and skill have been displayed to make the rich embossing. The third case is of ordinary silver, the works are of the finest watch metal, richly chased and engraved, and the specimen is indeed beautiful as well as unique. The watch keeps splendid time, and even if it is of such great age is more accurate than some of the modern watches as a timekeeper. Over twenty-five years ago a stranger who said that he was a farm hand brought the watch into Mr Ezra Nuckolls for repairs and since that time he has never been heard from and the jeweler feels that by failure of his many years to reclaim the watch the man has disappeared and the timepiece will rightfully belong to the jeweler.

Shooting Affair at Eldora

Dr H W Emery Suffering From Wound in Breast at Hospital

Eldora, April 10- Dr Harry W Emery, a prominent osteopath of this city, is lying at Emergency hospital, suffering from a bullet wound in the left breast, inflicted by Edward Nuckolls, a well-known young man here, and associated with his father Ezra Nuckolls in the jewelry business. Dr N C Morse, who is caring for the patient, does not as yet venture a prediction as to Emery's chances for living. At about 2 oclock yesterday morning residents in the east part of town heard several shots but knew not where they were fired or what the occasion might be. Some time after daylight it was learned that someone had been shot, and still later the information became circulated about town that Dr Emery was the victim, and that Ed Nuckolls did the shooting. Considerable mystery surrounds the shooting even yet, and different stories can be heard. It is stated that Nuckolls found Emery trying to enter his house at about 2 oclock yesterday morning and emptied his revolver into the flying form in the darkness. Nuckolls did not know until morning however, that he had wounded the doctor. The Nuckolls home has been under quarantine because the Nuckolls children were supposed to have scarlet fever. Mr Nuckolls has not been staying at home, but, hearing the other evening that the children had whooping cough, went home o see just what the situation was. About midnight, it is claimed, he was awakened by a rap at the door. He answered the call and found Dr Emery, who informed Nuckolls that he was looking for him and wanted him to go down to his office and sample some fine wine that he had purchased. Nuckolls complied, but after a short time excused himself, and said he would go to his room at the store and go to bed. Nuckolls was apparently suspicious and instead of going to the store and remaining, went for his revolver and returned home. An hour and a half later Emery is said to have again appeared at the Nuckolls home. Nuckolls followed him long enough to empty his revolver at him. Public sympathy is with Nuckolls, and as yet no arrests have been made. Emery is a handsome and sashing young man and, it is generally admitted, is responsible for the estrangement in the family of Frank W Crockett, the Des Moines lawyer and brother of former Clerk of the Supreme Court John C Crockett, now reading clerk of the United States Senate. Mrs Crockett was the widow of George Wisner, at one time the wealthiest young man in Hardin County.

I have some fond memories of that old outhouse, but I sure am thankful for today's modern conveniences!


Pappy, A Real Character

Pappy sure was a character. He believed in work and judged people's character that way, it seemed. He believed work determined whether you were "worth your salt" or not. He was known to give rides to and from Pineville, Bell County, Kentucky, only to people who were workers or came from working people. Once in the early part of winter a local man and his wife thumbed him for a ride to town. Pappy had one of his grandsons with him, so that made two in the cab of the truck. The man got in the front and put his wife in the back. Pappy called the man's attention to this and the man said, "That's alright, she'll be okay." Pappy told him he must not care much for his wife and made them both get out of the truck.

Once on the north side of Pineville, Pappy's tire on his truck was going flat, so he was out pumping it up near a gas station. The attendant yelled, "Hey mister, we have free air over here!" Pappy replied, "This ain't costin' anyone anything, is it?" He always had a quick reply to most everything.

One time he was planting potatoes and someone passed by and said, "Uncle Bob, you're not planting them on the right moon sign." Pappy replied, "I'm planting mine in the ground not on the moon." Another time at Pappy's grocery store a man spoke up and said, "I'm going home and shine my shoes till I can see myself in them." Pappy told him, "Better be careful, in my opinion you may get scared!" He sure was quick with his answers. I've heard people say that he wouldn't give some people the time of day. I remember a few people he was civil with when they questioned him, then they went on their way.

He enjoyed reading newspapers and was always up on what was going on in the world. I'd visit with him and he'd

share the news with me. Pappy worked in the log woods as a young man and cruised timber later in life. He had a grocery store up on Red Bird at one time. He farmed, of course, and gave his sons a whipping when he figured they needed it. Once my father, Colson, told me they had been back on the hillside hoeing corn. Dinnertime finally rolled around, and my dad decided he'd play off sick. He said, "I don't want any dinner, I don't feel good," and he retired to the bedroom where he could hear what was going on at the kitchen table. During the course of the meal, Pappy said to one of Daddy's brothers, "Go to the barn and find us some red worms and we'll just go fishing." Daddy fell for that and hopped out of bed and ran to the kitchen saying, "Pappy, I want to go, too!" Well as you might have guessed he got a good whipping and was sent back to the field to work!

Now during my time in Pappy's life

he had an ornery mule. I'm sure in his life he'd known his share of bad tempered horses and mules. He had used wagons for travel and for hauling supplies. Anyway, this particular mule would somehow manage to run away when some people worked him. If some of the family members were plowing at Pappy's place, the mule would balk on occasion. If Pappy walked out on the porch the mule would straighten up in a hurry. The mule and Pappy had an understanding with one another.

Once this horse trader who travelled throughout the Red Bird area stopped and wanted to buy this cantankerous mule. He wanted to know if the mule could be ridden. Pappy answered, "This boy here can ride him easily." So my cousin, Russell, walked to the barn and got a rope and put the rope in the halter of the mule. He then led the mule to a tree stump, got on his back and rode the mule up to where the buyer was. An offer for the mule was made and Pappy agreed. The mule was led into a new stock truck, tied, and the horse trader shut the enclosure. He paid Pappy something like \$225 for the mule. About that time the mule set in to kicking and braying and the splinters went to flying.

The horse trader wanted Pappy to calm the mule, but Pappy told him, "He's not my mule, he's your mule." So thinking quickly with his brand new truck in mind, the trader sold the mule back to Pappy, losing \$25 in the deal! So Russell rode the mule back to the barn lot and released him. I guess that was one mule who wanted to stay with his master real bad!

Robert Boyd Knuckles, or Pappy, had that "true grit" like true mountain people do. He was my grandfather and the son of Robert (Robin) Nuckols and Martha Neal. I admired him and will always remember our times together.

Kermit Nuckles sees his volunteer work as a small, sporadic part of his week: a handrail here, a chairlift there. "If I was getting paid for it, I'd be going hungry, let's put it that way," Nuckles said. But even though it's only a few hours a week, little pieces add up. Over the past 21 years, the 91-year-old retired contractor has put in thousands of volunteer hours for the local Volunteers of America handyman program and for Senior Alternatives in Transportation (SAINT). In October, he will be recognized for his contributions with Colorado's Outstanding Volunteer Award, one of the annual Governor's Service Awards, at the state Capitol. "I don't need any notoriety, but they want to do it, so I'll let them have their fun," he said. As one of longest standing volunteers for the VOA, Nuckles has logged 2,000 hours over the past 20 years. Each year, he completes 50 to 100 projects for the organization, installing grab bars, handrails and chair risers for seniors and people with disabilities. At the same time, he serves as a reserve driver for SAINT, helping community members who cannot drive get around Fort Collins. When other drivers can't make it, Nuckles fills in. He has given 2,900 as-needed rides over the past 11 years. Nuckles said he volunteers because "people are appreciative." Connie Nelson-Cleverly, the volunteer coordinator for SAINT, said that he exemplifies the dedication and concern for others valued by the organization. "Kermit is fantastic," Nelson-Cleverly said. "He is just so reliable he is always there when we need him to drive an extra shift.

SAINT has already recognized Nuckles for his ongoing service. In 2002, he won the Life Saver Award for a reliable employee "who can be counted on to come to the rescue" when another driver cancels or goes on vacation. More recently, he won the Volunteer of the Year award for 2010. "I think he's a true example of a volunteer spirit because he likes to help others and he's willing to use his talents and skills to do that," said Bill Patterson, the handyman program coordinator for VOA who nominated Nuckles for the award. 

TRYING TO CONNECT

Sacramento Daily Union, Sacramento, CA Aug 2, 1871

SHOOTING AFFRAY AT LIVERMORE - The Oakland Transcript of August 1st has this:

About 3 o'clock last Sunday afternoon a man named **J. KNUCKLES** was shot near Livermore by one BRADLEY, receiving frightful injuries about the face, but none which are likely to prove fatal. The affair was about a sum of money Bradley claimed belonged to him in the hands of Knuckles. Some time previous to the shooting, the men met and Bradley demanded the money. Afterward, while Knuckles was riding in a wagon a short distance from town, Bradley rode up to him on horse-back armed with a loaded shotgun and made another demand for the money. It was refused, whereupon Bradley took deliberate aim at Knuckles and fired. The greater part of the charge of shot entered Knuckles' lower jaw, tearing the chin entirely away and ripping the flesh down close to the windpipe. The tongue was also torn. Several shot entered the right shoulder. Bradley immediately rode away, and up to yesterday afternoon had not been heard from, although officers are out in search of him. The money transaction is given to us as follows: Bradley had been herding a large number of cattle, and owing a great many small bills his money was taken up by his creditors by powers of garnishee as fast as it became due. Bradley succeeded in getting a sum ahead, and to prevent its being seized placed it in the hands of Knuckles, who refused afterward to refund it.

R B NUCKOLLS of the state Savings Bank, W S Tallant of the Clark Bank and Joseph V Long testified that the signature was an awkward forgery

San Mateo CA Plain Dealer, Mar 27, 1966

A foot square chunk of ice crashed through a house roof Friday night and landed 15 feet from where a terrified family had been watching television. **Mrs Lorraine Nuckles**, 27, of San Mateo, told police she was sitting in the living room with her three children when she heard what she thought was a bomb. Police found a hole in the roof, the ice and no explanation. A United Air Lines plane overhead at the time reported later at San Francisco International Airport that no icing conditions had been encountered .

He was a student at Okaloosa-Walton Junior College.
